This issue of the Twycross Times marks the 6th anniversary of the first edition in December 2005. Looking back I have been struck by the amount of effort put into charitable fundraising by pupils of all ages and their teachers during that period.

The combined total sum raised at Twycross House and The Hollies was a staggering £44,800.58. The large number of charities which have benefited range from Cancer Research and Children in Need to the Air Ambulance Service and the Pakistan Flood Disaster Appeal, as well as smaller local charities. In addition, we have contributed shoes, CDs, Christmas gift boxes, text books and knitted blankets in response to specific appeals.

We never ask for money for school development but we do believe strongly that fundraising for charities outside the school is a vital part of the children's broad education. As well as facing full-on the difficulties which confront other people and being encouraged to do something practical to help, the children learn a wide range of skills.

First they have to discuss which charity they would like to support and why, bearing in mind that as a school we need to spread our efforts widely. They then have to decide on the sort of event which they will best be able to organise and to consider how and when to launch it. Forward planning is very important. Posters have to be made and reminders issued; people have to be approached tactfully for their support and thanked afterwards; cash has to be accounted for and the final sum raised has to be published. In some cases pupils will visit the recipients of their fund-raising and learn a great deal from the experience. On other occasions representatives of charities will come into school to talk to us about their work. Finally the whole project is reviewed so that the children can learn how to make their next charitable effort even more effective.

Our staff work very hard to help pupils of all ages to participate in this important activity and to take more of the responsibility upon themselves as they go up through the school. We are immensely grateful, too, for the unflagging support of our parents at all stages. Thank you so much – and a very Happy New Year to you all!



GERMAN EXCHANGE

Wednesday 2 November saw the arrival of the sixth German exchange group from the Dietrich Bonhoeffer Gymnasium in Schweich. Sixteen students, accompanied by group leaders Julie Lennig and Frank Fuhrmann, spent a week staying with students in Senior Four and their families. The exchange partners had been in contact since September, getting to know each other on Facebook,

and the week was a great success.

On their first day here the German group joined in lessons throughout the school. The visitors, who normally wear jeans



to school, made the effort to improvise school uniform and fit in with the school community. Twycross House staff were impressed by their very good English and politeness. They invariably left each lesson with a thank-you to their teacher.

Senior Four girls and their German partners were surprised to be taught Zumba dancing in their games lesson and found it an energetic and fun experience. Then the English girls taught their visitors netball - with simplified rules. Meanwhile Mr Perry was introducing the German boys to tag rugby. He was impressed by their powerful running, good sidestepping and by how quickly they picked up the game. In the football which followed, the visitors were more than a match for Twycross boys.

Mr Perry, who will again be in charge of the group on the return trip to Schweich in April, commented: 'This group of German students were not at all reticent, but selfconfident with excellent language skills and happy to hold a fluent conversation. They seemed relaxed in using English.'

On Friday the German party spent a day in Stratford visiting many of the famous Shakespeare houses and the church.

At the weekend the host families did all they could to make their guests welcome and many went to London for a day or to Birmingham shopping. Bonfire Night fell on the Saturday. Until now many Germans



had only read about it in English text books - nowhere near as much fun as the real thing.

After school on Tuesday the long-awaited basketball tournament took place in the Sports Hall under the watchful eyes of Mr Assinder and Mr Morrell. It was a really friendly, happy occasion, with all the German and English exchange students playing enthusiastically in mixed teams.

Wednesday 9 November saw a subdued group of parents, students and teachers waving goodbye to their new German friends, after some tearful farewells.

These comments are typical of many

'It was really good. We played x-box together and went shooting and paintballing. I taught my partner to drive. At the weekend we went to London together and went on the London Eye.'

'They were all very nice and I had a good time.'

'I really enjoyed the exchange. It was a great chance to practise your German and to socialise, and I think I've made some friends for life.

'I met a lot of new friends and we all get on really well. It was very emotional when the Germans left to go home. I can't wait to go back and see everyone

'Everyone was really sad to see them leave... I can't wait to go back to Germany next April.'

Thank you to everyone – students, parents and staff – who worked so hard to make this exchange a success. Even more beneficial was when the director asked if the students would like to meet the 'players' to ask them questions about their various roles.

FOOTBALL
