



Lecturers at the university offered us a chance to ask any questions regarding both our upcoming exams and preparing with effective revision techniques.

Despite the limitations of Covid restrictions over the last two years, the school orchestra has continued to grow and now has over 20 young musicians (with an average age of 10 years old) in it playing on a wide selection of instruments. record numbers of participants and is currently practising hard preparing for the Young Voices concert in May at the Resorts World Arena, Birmingham.

For the majority of children in The Swallows, the 8th March concert was their very first time performing in front of an audience, having had this experience denied from them over the last two years, and for the older children these performances were a welcome return to the joys of performing we had all enjoyed in pre-Covid times.

Watching the energy and enthusiasm of all these talented performers, whether aged 8 or aged 18, was so special after so long a gap and for many of us, we really appreciated what we've missed out on during this pandemic. It was also noticeable

that whereas the year-group bubbles forced children apart, these performances (and the rehearsals for them) have helped bring back the whole-school community and it was particularly inspiring to observe the support and encouragement the children from different year groups gave each other.

COMPUTER STUDIES

Form 5 have been looking at the many ways in which a given task can be approached and solved through human thinking, as well as placed alongside computational thinking.

When looking at algorithms, pupils were tasked with creating a set of instructions for a family member to follow in making a sandwich. Through this, pupils developed a stronger understanding of the importance of clear and concise instructions for success, both in this task and when setting programme on the computer.

In pattern recognition, pupils created pattern identification sheets using different shape and colour patterns. These were for their peers to follow and then to identify the next and/or missing parts to any given pattern sequence.

In their decomposition task, pupils were required to plan design and create the tallest free-standing tower from newspaper.

When looking at abstraction, pupils were provided with far more information than they required about a new Pokémon character. From this they had to abstract the key information, before bringing the character to life in the form of a 2D image. These Pokémon pictures were produced and judged. TWYCROSS CHEMISTS ARE RUNNERS UP IN THE TOP OF THE BENCH NATIONAL FINAL

On the afternoon of Monday 21 March, Kierit Lehal (S5), Elliot Lewis (S4), Lauren Garland and Jessica Salt (S3) put on their lab coats and brand-new Royal of Society safety glasses and entered the lab to take on the practical challenge, not only representing our school but the West Midlands region as well. Despite the virtual nature of this year's competition due to Covid, in total, 116 students from across the UK and Belgium took part this year.

During the afternoon, the students made a standard solution of copper nitrate and then carefully diluted the solution 11 times. This was followed by using a simple spectrophotometer to measure the amount of light transmitted through the coloured solutions. They also carried out some tests to identify unknown samples. The students worked hard all afternoon producing great results, but I was most impressed by how well they worked together as a team. A couple of days later they sat a 30-minute individual test on their chemistry knowledge.

The results arrived on the morning of 1 April, so I was a little wary, but the team came together at break and watched a short video announcing the top 6 teams.

I am very pleased to share the news that the Twycross House School team came 6th out of 28 schools. As runners up, the team will receive a prize.

Over the Easter holiday they and their parents have been invited to Coventry University to receive their prizes so more photos to follow soon. Congratulations to all the students!


BEE BOT
